*Show Attire - Black pants with white collared shirt or western dress.

*Grand Champion Showmanship - To qualify for Grand Champion Showman, exhibitors must meet show attire rule.

*All purebred sheep must be accompanied with registration paperwork.

Showmanship is mandatory. All exhibitors must show in their respective showmanship class.

Class No.

301 Fitting and Showmanship – 14 years of age and over. Showmanship classes will be combined so that competition exists in all of the Showmanship classes.

303 Fitting and Showmanship – 13 years of age and under.

305 Novice Fitting and Showmanship

Market Lamb Showmanship Classes

-Showmanship is mandatory. All exhibitors must show in their respective showmanship class.

-For showman who will be showing only a market lamb.

-There will be in no other fitting and showmanship class.

-Divided, if entries warrant.

A Champion and Reserve Champion Showman will be named.

307 Market Lamb Showmanship – 14 years of age and over.

309 Market Lamb Showmanship – 13 years of age and over.

311 Cloverbud Showmanship

313 Halter and Leadline Showmanship, divided if entries warrant.

315 Leadline Showman – Wool Outfit or Accessory. Same as Class #313, except that exhibitor must wear an outfit they have made from wool or an accessory they have made from wool.

Animal Registry Forms must accompany 4-H Fair Entries

500 Pair of Lambs. Either sex or mixed. Born January 1 of the current year. Can be owned by 4-H members in the same family. Does not include market animals.

502 Mature Dam w/Spring Ram or Ewe Lamb. Born January 1 of the current year.

504 Pen of 3 Breeding Lambs.

506 Best Breeding Animal Bred and Owned by Exhibitor – must have registration papers.

508 Pen of 3 Market Lambs.

(either sex or mixed, born Jan. 1st of the current year). Can be owned by 4-H members in the same family.

510 Purebred Flock. Definition: Shall consist of one ram (yearling or lamb), one ewe over two years, and one yearling ewe, and two ewe lambs.

512 Market Animals Not Registered for Auction OR Not Eligible for Auction. (May be divided by weight.) Market lambs that do not make weight will be entered in this class.

514 Market Lamb Registered for Auction (born after January 1 of the current year, may be divided by weight) Only 2 animals per class will be allowed after final weight/class breaks are made.

For each specie (meat goat, beef, sheep, swine) of auction animal, a Grand Champion, Reserve Grand Champion, and Honorable Mention Champion will be selected.

520 Best Market Animal Owned and Bred by Exhibitor
522 Records Class – All exhibitors are required to submit records on the expense involved with raising your animal. **All auction exhibitors must submit a 4-H Livestock Auction Project Record. Auction exhibitors handing in an incomplete Project Record will be disqualified from the auction. Project Records must be turned in to the 4-H Summer Assistant by Monday of fair week at the livestock ring from 3:00-5:00 p.m. No Project Record will be accepted after 5 pm per the 4-H Livestock Advisory Committee. Animal will be entered in to a non-auction class and will be disqualified from the 4-H Livestock Auction.** Superintendent or a designee will judge these records during the fair and premiums will be awarded.

FLEECE CLASSES

-Do not tie fleeces with twine.
-Bring in a plastic bag or basket.

525 Fine Wool (64's and finer-22 micron)
526 Medium Wool (50's thru 62's-22-30 micron)
527 Long Wool (48's and coarser-31 micron)
528 Natural Colored Wool

4-H Cloverbuds ages 5, 6, and 7 will be allowed to participate in a special Cloverbud Class in the Goat, Sheep and Swine Sections.

1. Cloverbuds will receive an incentive award and will receive a Cloverbud rosette. Participants will not be placed. This is a Participation Class not a Competition Class.
2. Cloverbuds must show young animals. Animal should be born after February 1st, and the Cloverbuds must have worked with the animal from February up until fair time. The Cloverbuds must be able to control the animal. Halter and leadline are recommended where appropriate.
3. Older members or adults helping in the ring is acceptable.
4. Cloverbuds are not eligible to participate in auction classes or the 4-H Livestock Auction.

A Champion and Reserve Champion of each breed will be named, both male and female. Best 2 females in each breed will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Female. Best 2 males in each breed will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Male. A Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Market Animal will be named.

A Supreme Champion (Best of Show) will be selected from all Grand Champion animals.

4-H MASTER LIVESTOCK SHOWMAN

Beef – Swine – Sheep - Meat Goat

Award Presenter-Matt Shelton

1. It would consist of the top **senior** (13 years and older) showman of the beef, swine, sheep, and meat goat show.
2. Four animals from each species would be selected for the competition. None of the animals chosen for the competition would be personally owned by the exhibitors. Each animal would be assigned to the respective showman randomly.
3. A panel of four judges would be selected by the livestock committee to judge the competition. Each judge would have knowledge of at least one of the species.
4. The four species would be shown one after the other. Each exhibitor would be given a numerical ranking of 1 through 4 after each individual specie show. One being the highest and four being the lowest score. The showman with the lowest overall total would be the winner.
5. If a showman is the winner of both the swine and the beef or any other two showmanship classes the reserve champion of one of the species would take their place in the master showmanship competition.
6. Trophy awarded to winner.
